

Curbside Organics Collection

by Katrina Miller

Starting in the spring of 2002, the city will phase-in curbside collection of organics, beginning with 170,000 single-family homes. These compostables will be taken to an anaerobic digestion plant that will turn organic refuse into highquality, marketable compost for gardens, and methane gas for electricity generation. With the cost just slightly more than shipping garbage to landfill sites, the service is expected to be citywide by 2005.




